The Compassionate God

John 5:1-15 ¹Some time later there was a feast of the Jews, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ²Now there is in Jerusalem near the Sheep Gate a pool with five covered colonnades, which in Aramaic is called Bethesda. ³On these walkways lay a great number of the sick, the blind, the lame, and the paralyzed. ⁵One man there had been an invalid for thirty-eight years. ⁶When Jesus saw him lying there and realized that he had spent a long time in this condition, He asked him, "Do you want to get well?" ⁷"Sir," the invalid replied, "I have no one to help me into the pool when the water is stirred. While I am on my way, someone else goes in before me." ⁸Then Jesus told him, "Get up, pick up your mat, and walk." ⁹Immediately the man was made well, and he picked up his mat and began to walk. Now this happened on the Sabbath day, ¹⁰so the Jews said to the man who had been healed, "This is the Sabbath! It is unlawful for you to carry your mat." ¹¹But he answered, "The man who made me well told me, 'Pick up your mat and walk." ¹²"Who is this man who told you to pick it up and walk?" they asked. ¹³But the man who was healed did not know who it was, for Jesus had slipped away while the crowd was there. ¹⁴Afterward, Jesus found the man at the temple and said to him, "See. you have been made well. Stop sinning, or something worse may happen to you." ¹⁵And the man went away and told the Jews that it was Jesus who had made him well. (BSB)

John 5:3-4 ³In these lay a great multitude of impotent folk, of blind, halt, withered, waiting for the moving of the water. ⁴For an angel went down at a certain season into the pool, and troubled the water: whosoever then first after the troubling of the water stepped in was made whole of whatsoever disease he had. (KJV)

- **I.** Here are the details of this passage.
 - A. This *event* happened in Jerusalem at an unknown feast. V.1
 - **B.** There was a ceremonial pool there called **Bethesda**.
 - C. The <u>sick</u> lay on the walkways outside the pool. V.3
 - **D.** The newer <u>versions</u> do not have part of verse 3 and all of verse 4 in them because they were not a part of the original gospel. These words were added in by a scribe centuries after the gospel was written.
 - **E.** There was a belief that an <u>angel</u> would stir the water and only the first one in would receive healing. V.4

- **F.** One of those lying there was a man who had been unable to walk for <u>38 years</u>. V. 5
- G. Jesus asked the man a very important *question*. V. 6
- **H.** The man could never <u>compete</u> against those who were faster and more connected than him. V. 7
- I. Jesus healed the man with a *simple* command. V.8
- J. The Jews were *upset* because the man was carrying his mat on a Sabbath. V.10
- **K.** The healed man <u>blamed</u> the man who had told him to get up and carry his mat. (He didn't know that it was Jesus.) V.11-13
- **L.** Jesus *confronted* the man regarding his sin. V.14
- M. The man <u>betrayed</u> Jesus and told the Jews that it was Jesus who told him to violate the Sabbath. V. 15
- II. What can we learn from this passage?
 - **A.** Many are held *captive* by false belief.
 - **B.** We need to see value in multiple <u>versions</u> of Scripture. Remember that the Bible was not written in English!
 - C. Not everything *supernatural* is healthy or godly!
 - **D.** *God* heals!
 - **E.** We must <u>ask</u> people if they really want to get well. Many say they want to get healed but the price may be more than they want to pay.
 - **F.** We must guard against a <u>legalistic</u> attitude when God does something outside our comfort zone.
 - **G.** Our *loyalties* must be to God over all others.
