II Corinthians 1:1-11

¹Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, To the church of God in Corinth, together with all the saints throughout Achaia: ²Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, ⁴who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves have received from God. 5For just as the sufferings of Christ overflow to us, so also through Christ our comfort overflows. ⁶If we are afflicted, it is for your comfort and salvation; if we are comforted, it is for your comfort, which accomplishes in you patient endurance of the same sufferings we experience. ⁷And our hope for you is sure, because we know that just as you share in our sufferings, so also you will share in our comfort. 8We do not want you to be unaware, brothers, of the hardships we encountered in the province of Asia. We were under a burden far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired even of life. 9Indeed, we felt we were under the sentence of death, in order that we would not trust in ourselves, but in God, who raises the dead. ¹⁰He has delivered us from such a deadly peril, and He will deliver us. In Him we have placed our hope that He will yet again deliver us, ¹¹as you help us by your prayers. Then many will give thanks on our behalf for the favor shown us in answer to their prayers. (BSB)

- I. Here are the details of this passage.
 - A. Paul is <u>dictating</u> this message to the Corinthian church using Timothy as a scribe. V. 1
 - **B.** Verse 2 is a standard *greeting* that Paul uses in his letters.
 - C. <u>Compassion</u> is seeing someone in need and feeling deeply about it. V. 3
 - D. <u>Comfort</u> is a proper response through compassion to those in need. V. 3
 - E. We <u>reciprocate</u> to others what we have first received from God. V. 4-7
 - **F.** Paul faced severe suffering for the *benefit* of the local churches that he served. V. 8-10
 - **G.** Paul was greatly helped by the <u>prayers</u> of those who constantly held him up to God through these **prayers**. V. 11
- II. How can we apply these truths in our life?
 - **A.** We shouldn't be held back by <u>pride</u> in asking others to help us when we sincerely need it.
 - **B.** We should also look for ways to <u>help</u> others in their distress.
 - **C.** If we have never <u>received</u> grace from God, we are incapable of <u>giving</u> this kind of grace to others.
 - **D.** We must be **<u>specific</u>** and **<u>direct</u>** in our prayers.
