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Hope and the Expectations of New

Behold, I am about to do something new; even now it is coming. Do you not see it? Indeed, I will make a way in the wilderness and streams in the desert. ~ Isaiah 43:19 (BSB)

I have enjoyed kicking off this new year with a series on what the Bible says about God wanting to do something new. One thing that I have noticed in every sermon is that God often equates the expectation of something new happening with the biblical concept of Hope. Hope is defined as the passionate expectation of something positive happening in the future. This passionate expectation often changes the present to fit the expectation that has not yet happened. Hope changes the present!

The passage that is mentioned above is a perfect example of this. The prophecy mentioned here from Isaiah 43 is a messianic prophecy. It is proclaiming that God is going to do something new in Israel. He is not going to leave her in a permanent desert, He is going to revive Israel. This happened partially when John the Baptist showed up proclaiming that Jesus was about to show Himself. It also partially happened when the Holy Spirit was poured out at Pentecost. However, when the prophecy was given, it was still going to be centuries before all of this was to happen. God still has a plan for His people today to give them hope and to change their current situation.

I believe that God is in the process of giving us encouragement at our church. There have been times when it seemed like God was done using us here for His kingdom. I believe that this is not true. I believe that God has been renewing my strength by renewing my hope. May God continue to refresh our expectations of good things coming our way. May the Holy Spirit fill us afresh with a passionate expectation of the new. "Even now it is coming. Do you not see it?"

"A Gift A Day Month"

I was reading today's "Our Daily Bread" devotional and read a story about a woman crocheting on a plane trip. A 5 month old baby was near her and watched her crochet. The woman changed her plans and during the one hour flight completed a little hat for the child, to the surprise and joy of the family. I had read this story before and wondered if the publishers repeat devotionals? However as I read further I discovered the thought garnered from this devotional was different.

This devotional was based on the scripture of Acts 9:36. "... Tabitha was always doing good and helping the poor." Tabitha was commended at her death for all the good things she had done. While scripture goes on to include Peter bringing her back to life, the devotional focused on loving actions being a "testimony" of Tabitha's love and care.

That brings us to the question of our testimony. What are we leaving behind as we interact with others? Last month's newsletter article had us looking at our testimony our life story. As a follower of Christ we all have a "before" testimony; we will have an "after" - especially an after-life testimony. We also have an "as" story. "As we walk with Christ", we leave footsteps, good or bad. What if we choose to intentionally share kindnesses? What if we choose the month of March and have a little fun by doing good?

Food Pantry and Life Center Boxes


Consider donating to the food pantry and Life Center collection boxes this month.
